

Ann Hopkins Smith tin box contents

- 1 Handmade wooden frame which surrounds a white or cream paper with black print entitled "Rules for anyone who wishes to enter the buildings of Mrs Ann Hopkins Smith. Buildings erected or endowed by Mrs Ann Hopkins Smith", undated
- 2 Green covered book entitled "A.H.Smith's Executors: Cash". Inside front and back covers are marble paper, inside front cover there is a label which reads "From Nissen and Parker, Stationers, 43 Mark Lane, London. Every article for the counting house". Front and back covers are stiff. Included within the book is a piece of cream paper which has handwritten sums of money and notes all over the inside most of which have been crossed out. The book itself is also handwritten. Dated 1851 1883.



This Indenture made the first day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty four Between Samuel Chappell of Honey Lane Market in the City of London Butcher and Mary Ann his Wife (late Mary Ann Goosey Spinster) of the one part and William Dunckley of Stamford Hill in the County of Middlesex Gentleman and Joseph Willsher of Towcester in the County of Northampton Grocer of the other part Whereas by a certain Indenture bearing date the seventeenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and twenty made between the said Samuel Chappell of the first part the said Mary Ann Chappell (then Mary Ann Goosey) of the second part and the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher of the third part After reciting that a Marriage was then intended to be solemnized between the said Samuel Chappell and Mary Ann Goosey that the said Mary Ann Goosey was intitled to the sum of One thousand pounds that it was agreed the same should be paid into the hands of the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher by the said Mary Ann Goosey Upon the Trusts thereinafter mentioned And also that the same sum had been paid to them accordingly It is by the now reciting Indenture Witnessed and declared that the said sum of One thousand pounds was so paid to the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher Upon the Trusts thereinafter mentioned (that is to say) Upon Trust for the said Mary Ann Chappell (then Mary Ann Goosey) until the said then intended marriage should be had and solemnized and after the solemnization thereof Upon Trust to pay the sum of Five hundred pounds (part of the said sum of One thousand pounds) unto the said Samuel Chappell to and for his own use And as to the sum of Five hundred pounds (remaining part thereof) Upon Trust that they the said Trustees should with the consent and approbation of the said Mary Ann Chappell (then Mary Ann Goosey) invest the sum upon public or private security and should pay the interest thereof from time to time to such persons as the said Mary Ann Chappell (then Mary Ann Goosey) should notwithstanding her coverture by any Note or writing under her hand direct or appoint and if she should make no such direction or appointment then into the proper hands of the said Mary Ann Chappell (then Mary Ann Goosey) for her own use independent of her husband And from and after the decease of the said Mary Ann Chappell (then Mary Ann Goosey) they the said Trustees should stand possessed of the said sum of Five hundred pounds Upon trust for the benefit of such person or persons and to and for such uses as the said Mary Ann Chappell (then Mary Ann Goosey) at any time or times after the solemnization of the said then intended Marriage during her life should direct or appoint the same as therein mentioned And for want or in default of such Appointment upon Trust for the said Samuel Chappell his executors or administrators for his or their own use And in which said Indenture now in recital was a Proviso that if the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher should desire to be discharged from the Trusts aforesaid before the same should be fully performed and executed then it should be lawful for the said Mary Ann Chappell (then Mary Ann Goosey) during her life notwithstanding er Coverture and whether married or sole by any writing under her hand to nominate and appoint such other person or persons who should think fit to be and act as a Trustee or Trustees in the place and stead of the Trustee or Trustees so desiring to be discharged therefrom And that upon the appointment of such new Trustee or Trustees the said sum of Five hundred pounds or the Securities whereon the same should be placed out or invested at interest as aforesaid should be transferred or assigned in such manner that the same might be legally vested in the surviving or continuing Trustee and such new Trustee or Trustees or in such new Trustees only Upon the Trusts and for the purposes and subject to the powers provisoes and agreements therein and thereby expressed and declared concerning the same and the interest or annual income and produce thereof or such of them as should be then subsisting or capable of taking effect As in and by the said in part recited Indenture reference being thereunto had will more fully appear And Whereas the said Marriage took effect soon after the date and execution of the said in part recited Indenture and immediately thereupon the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher paid unto the said Samuel Chappell the sum of Five hundred pounds part of the said sum of One thousand pounds so paid into their hands upon the trusts hereinbefore mentioned And at the request and by and with the consent and approbation of the said Mary Ann Chappell lent and advanced unto her Brother Nathaniel Goosey upon his Bond the sum of Five hundred pounds

(remaining part of the said sum of One thousand pounds) which said last mentioned sum of Five hundred pounds is still due and owing upon the said Bond but all interest thereof hath been paid or otherwise satisfied unto the said Mary Ann Chappell up to the day of the date hereof And Whereas the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher are desirous of being discharged from the Trusts of the said part recited Indenture of Settlement And the said Samuel Chappell and Mary Ann his Wife and each of them are and is minded and desirous to revoke and make void the Uses in the said Indenture contained And that the said Bond from the said Nathaniel Goosey should be assigned over to the said Samuel Chappell his executors administrators and assigns to and for his or their own immediate use and benefit **Now this Indenture Witnesseth** that for the purpose of discharging the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher from their trusteeship under the said Indenture the said Mary Ann Chappell (by and with the consenting approbation of her said husband testified by his executing these Presents) by virtue and in execution of the power reserved to her for that purpose by the said in part recited Indenture **Hath** nominated substituted and appointed and by this present Deed or Writing under hand and seal Doth nominate substitute and appoint the said Samuel Chappell to be a Trustee in the place and stead of the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher Now this Indenture Witnesseth that for the purpose of vesting the said in part recited Bond and the Principal sum of Five hundred pounds and interest secured thereby in the said Samuel Chappell in pursuance and for the purposes of the said Indenture of Settlement They the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher in consideration of five shillings paid to them by the said Samuel Chappell Have (at the request and by the direction and appointment of the said Mary Ann Chappell also of her said Husband (testified by their severally executing these Presents) bargained sold assigned transferred and set over and by these presents Do bargain sell assign transfer and set over unto the said Samuel Chappell his executors administrators and assigns **The** said in part recited Bond from the said Nathaniel Goosey to the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher And also the Principal sum of Five hundred pounds and interest now due and to grow due thereon And all the estate right title and interest of them the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher of in and to the same **To hold** the same unto the said Samuel Chappell his executers administrators and assigns upon and for such trusts intents and purposes as are limited expressed and declared of and concerning the said sum of Five hundred pounds so remaining in the hands of the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher and placed out by them at interest as aforesaid And for the purpose of enabling the said Samuel Chappell to recover and receive the said Principal sum of Five hundred pounds in the hands of the said Nathaniel Goosev as aforesaid They the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher Have made constituted and appointed and by these Presents Do make constitute and appoint the said Samuel Chappell their lawful Attorney to recover and receive the same and also the interest from henceforth to grow due thereon And upon receipt thereof to give unto the said Nathaniel Goosey a good and sufficient release and discharge for the same And for the considerations aforesaid They the said Samuel Chappell and Mary Ann his Wife Do and each of them Doth remise release and for ever guit claim unto the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher their executors and administrators All and all manner of action and actions cause and causes of action suits accounts reckonings claims and demands whatsoever which they the said Samuel Chappell and Mary Ann his Wife or either of them now have or hath or which they or either of them their or either of their Appointees executors administrators or assigns can shall or may at any time hereafter have or claim against the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher their executors or administrators for or in respect of the said sum of Five hundred pounds so left in their hands and by them lent and advanced unto the said Nathaniel Goosey as aforesaid or of the interest now due or henceforth to become due for the same or of any matter cause or thing whatsoever relative thereto And this Indenture also Witnesseth that for the purpose of revoking and making void the uses in the said recited Indenture of Settlement contained and being satisfied that it would be much more for the benefit of them the said Samuel Chappell and Mary Ann his Wife and their future prospects in life that the said sum of Five hundred pounds so secured by the Bond of the said Nathaniel Goosey as aforesaid should be received by the said Samuel Chappell for his own use She the said Mary Ann Chappell Doth hereby direct and appoint that the said sum of Five hundred pounds and interest shall be so received by him the said Samuel Chappell to and for his own use and benefit And that the uses declared of and concerning the said sum of Five hundred pounds and interest in and by the said in part recited Indenture of Settlement shall from henceforth be and they are hereby revoked and made void And they the said Samuel Chappell and

Joseph Willsher and the survivor of them his executors or administrators shall stand possessed of the said sum of five hundred pounds or the funds and securities upon which the same shall be placed out at interest as aforesaid **Upon trust** for and for the benefit of such person or persons and in or by such parts or shares and in such manner or upon such trusts and to and for such uses intents and purposes as the said Mary Ann Goosey at any time or times after the solemnization of the said intended marriage during her life by her last Will and testament or any instrument in the nature of or purporting to be her will or by any Codicil thereto to be by her duly executed in the presence of and to be attested by two or more credible witnesses notwithstanding her coverture and whether married or sole shall direct or appoint give or bequeath the same or any part or parts thereof and for want or in default of such appointment or bequest of such sum of five hundred pounds or the stocks funds and securities whereon the same shall be placed out at interest as aforesaid or of any part thereof then the whole thereof or so much thereof of which no such bequest or appointment shall be made shall be **Upon Trust** for the said Samuel Chappell his executors or administrators and be paid assigned or transferred by the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher or the survivor of them his executors or administrators to the said Samuel Chappell his executors or administrators to and for his and their own absolute use and benefit Provided always and it is hereby further agreed and declared that if the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher or either of them or any other trustee to be appointed by virtue of this power shall die or refuse or decline to act in the trusts aforesaid or desire to be discharged therefrom before the same shall be fully performed and executed then and so often as it shall happen it shall and may be lawful to and for the said Mary Ann Goosey during her life notwithstanding her coverture and whether married or sole by any writing or writings under her hand to nominate and appoint such other person or persons as she shall think fit to be and act as trustee or trustees in the place and stead of the trustee or trustees so dving or refusing or declining to and in the said trusts or desiring to be discharged therefrom and that upon the appointment of such new trustee or trustees the said sum of five hundred pounds or the stocks funds or securities whereon the same shall be placed out or invested at interested as aforesaid shall be transferred or assigned in such manner that the same may be legally vested in the surviving or continuing trustee and such new trustee or trustees or in such new trustees only **Upon the Trusts** and for the purposes and subject to the powers provisoes and agreements herein and hereby expressed and declared concerning the same and the interest or annual income and produce thereof or such of them as shall be then subsisting or capable of taking effect **Provided also** and it is hereby further agreed and declared that they the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher or either of them or any other trustee who shall be appointed in pursuance of the power hereinbefore in that behalf contained or their or either of their executors or administrators shall not be responsible or accountable for or charged with any more of the interest or annual income and produce of the said five hundred pounds than shall be actually received by them or either of them or come to their or either of their hands by virtue or means of this settlement or the trusts thereof nor with or for any loss or reduction which shall or may happen of or in the Securities stocks or funds upon which the said sum of five hundred pounds shall be placed or laid out at interest as aforesaid or the interest or annual income and produce thereof or any part thereof respectively without his or their or some or one of their wilful neglect or default nor the one of them for the other of them but each of them for himself and for his own acts receipts and payments and wilful neglect or default only and that each of them the said William Dunckley and Joseph Willsher and such other trustee or trustees as shall be appointed as aforesaid and their respective executors or administrators shall and lawfully may at and upon all times and occasions whatsoever during the said trusts deduct and reimburse himself and themselves respectively from and out of the trust monies aforesaid or the interest income or produce thereof all costs charges and expences whatsoever which they or either of them shall pay expend or be put unto in or about the execution or performance of the trusts of this Settlement or any suit or proceeding act matter or thing whatsoever relative thereto or concerning the same in any wise howsoever In witness whereof the said parties to these presents have hereunto set their hands and seals the day and year first above written
